

## DR. EDWARD ZIGLER

*"Adults must take seriously their responsibilities to assure that all children receive excellent physical care and to promote healthy social environments for a strong psychological growth"*



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As a young professor with a specialty in early childhood education, Dr. Edward Zigler was invited in 1964 to join a panel of experts mandated to create a national intervention program for children aged three to five living in poverty. From that work came the groundbreaking program known as Head Start.

Dr. Zigler's interest in the Head Start program never lagged and he fought against budget cuts that would harm it. He also spoke out when he saw the quality of the program's services endangered by poor planning and poor policies. As the Sterling Professor of Psychology, Emeritus, at Yale University, he is the founding director of the former Bush Center in Child Development and Social Policy, now renamed the Edward Zigler Center for Child Development and Social Policy. Dr. Zigler's work has focused on mental retardation, psychopathology, and intervention programs for disadvantaged children and the effects of childcare on children.

Senator Landon Pearson's life and work are a testament to the idea that Canada's future depends upon its children receiving the best start possible in life. As the wife of a diplomat and the mother of five children, Landon Pearson volunteered for organizations working with children. She was appointed Vice-Chairperson of the Canadian Commission for the International Year of the Child, where she edited the 1979 report "For Canada's Children: A National Agenda for Action." She served for several years as President and then Chairperson of the Canadian Council on Children and Youth.

In 2004, Landon Pearson presented to the United Nations the document "A Canada Fit for Children", which she helped develop. The document outlined the Canadian government's commitment to children and families, and included many recommendations focused on the early childhood years. She was called to the Senate in 1994, where, in her words, she strives to be the "Senator for Children."
